






















FAMILY FEUD



"Join clubs and societies - you will probably sign up to lots of these in freshers week, Don't just do ChemEng. I joined Lacrosse / Powerlifting / Pole Dancing / Shooting in 1st / 2nd / 3rd year and it gave me something different to look forward to every week."

"Don't be afraid to ask for help if you feel like you are falling behind, the department has many channels there to help you. Many people can be helpful and encouraging, but no-one's going to help you if you don't ask for the help."

"Talk to your elders - they have been through it before and give you good advice from anything homework to life advice - like a big sister. Speak to them to learn about planning for uni and beyond - four years is a really short time."

"Don't be afraid of struggling. This is a step up from what you're used to - and you're trying to balance academics with 'adult life'. Uni will challenge you and push you beyond what you thought possible. This may mean spending more time on a subject than you previously allowed."

READ SOME BOOKS


After reality TV, you need something to reset your IQ points. There are loads of great books around - check out your local library, or grab something from your local charity shop.
